Exploring India's Agriculture with LEAD MD

This past January along with 15 other LEAD Maryland fellows I headed off to the United Arab Emirates and India. This trip is the culmination of our two year program. The purpose of the international trip is to put our group of up and coming agricultural leaders out of our comfort zone and to give us the opportunity to gain different perspectives on other cultures. I was fascinated with the agriculture in India and would like to briefly share a few takeaways with you.

Seventy percent of farms in India are less than 2.5 acres. No that is not a misprint! This country that is roughly the size of one third of the United States is comprised of tiny family owned farms. In January India's agricultural state called Punjab can be described in two colors, green and yellow. On our drive through the country we passed vast fields of wheat and seas of yellow mustard. Rice is the most important crop in India, but since we were visiting during the winter season rice was not yet planted. The

MD Grain Producers Scholarship

Are you aware of the Maryland Grain Producers scholarship? The purpose of the scholarship program is to provide financial support to students interested in pursuing an agriculturally related career. Scholarship funding is provided by the Maryland Grain Checkoff Program, which supports promotion, education and research projects beneficial to the grain industry. More than \$160,000 in college scholarships has been awarded since the program was established in 1991. The program is administered by the Maryland Grain Producers Association, which will be awarding up to four deserving students pursuing a career in agriculture with scholarships in the amount of \$2,500 each.

To be eligible for these scholarships one must be a resident of the state of Maryland and be enrolled or accepted to a four-year institution working toward a Bachelor of Science Degree or enrolled or accepted to a two-year institution with an agricultural program. The applicant or the applicant's immediate family, must be involved in the production of grain in Maryland.

Frederick County Farm Safety Camp is scheduled for **July 6-8** at Camp Round Meadow in Catoclin Mountain Park, 4840 Manahan Road, Sabillasville, Md. Legislative Affairs Committee

MCFB has been working very hard in Annapolis on deer hunting bills to help decrease the deer population. HB310 Deer Hunting Sundays adds an additional 11 partial days of Sunday hunting in the County during the hunting season. HB313 Archery Hunting Safety Zone decreases the safety zone from 100 yards to 50 yards where an archery hunter can discharge a bow from a public street or occupied dwelling. The MC Delegation House and Senate members voted in favor of the bills. HB310 passed the House 3/20/17.

Twelve MCFB members met with legislators February 8 to discuss agriculture issues during MD Farm Bureau Day in Annapolis. Delegate Eric Luedtke recognized Miss Montgomery County Farm Bureau Sara Lechlinder during the House Session for her service to Montgomery County Agriculture.

The County Council approved Bill 31-16 Urban Agricultural Tax Credit allowing property owners within 1,000 feet of Metro Station Policy Area where their property is between ½ acre up to 3 acres to apply for an Urban Agricultural Tax Credit provided they generate at least \$5,000 in sales or donated agricultural products. climate of India sets up a rotation of wheat in the cooler winter months and rice in the monsoon summer months. A few other crops we noticed were sugarcane, cauliflower and potatoes, which are also very much a part of the Indian diet.

Education and agriculture extension programs are desperately needed in order for this country to sustain its massive population growth which now exceeds 1.2 billion.
